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Introduction

We are delighted to present this, the second edition of our very successful guide to finding the right homeopathy course for you. This updated edition includes more UK colleges (and one in Japan), offering courses at diploma, degree and post-qualification level.

If you're interested in studying homeopathy, which course should you choose? With so many different courses available - including correspondence courses, university courses, and courses run by private colleges - it's hard to know which one will be right for you. We hope this booklet, compiled by the Alliance of Registered Homeopaths (ARH), will help you make your choice.

Please note that ARH does not monitor, recognise, validate or endorse any particular homeopathic college or training course.

The Alliance of Registered Homeopaths approached all the UK providers of homeopathic education known to them, and asked them for information about their courses. A total of 26 replied (plus one from Japan), sending us the information contained here.

We recommend that all prospective students find out as much as they can about a college or course before they commit themselves. We hope that the information provided in this guide will serve as a good starting point.

What's right for you?

Just as in homeopathy we give an individual prescription to match each patient's needs, so in pursuing your homeopathic education you should find a course that meets your needs.

If you're considering studying homeopathy, it's important to bear in mind that the provision of homeopathic training in the UK covers a broad spectrum, and that there is no standardised qualification. Practitioner training courses offer either a diploma or a degree in homeopathy, which are of equal value to the graduate wanting to practise as a homeopath in the UK.

We would advise students from overseas who are intending to study in the UK to first check what qualifications for practice are required in their own countries, if they are considering returning home to practise after their training.

Making your choice

When it comes to education, we all have our preferred learning style, and it's important to choose a college that matches yours.

The best way to find out about this is to visit the college when it's in action, to observe how things work and talk to other students. Some people are happy to learn through lectures, others prefer to discover things for themselves, and for some a mixture of both approaches is the best solution. Most students appreciate a change of pace and a variety of approaches to teaching and learning. If you work better in small groups, then class size will be an important consideration for you. Many colleges not only require their tutors to be qualified and experienced homeopaths, but will expect them to have also undergone some teacher training so they can best meet their students' needs.

You'll need to ask about the college's methods of assessment. For example, does it use tests or examinations or a system of self-assessment and portfolio building, and is support available to help with this?

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As you progress in your studies, you'll be expected to increase your clinical experience by sitting \geq in on clinics run by experienced homeopaths, and/or by prescribing for your own patients under supervision. This may involve additional time and expense, so you'll want to be clear at the outset what commitment is expected

You may want to know where you can find help and resources to support your studies. Facilities, and also staff-student ratios, vary from course to course. The amount you would be expected to work alone outside of college, or find additional resources to cover the syllabus, varies too. For example, some colleges may encourage non-medically qualified students to undertake additional instruction in anatomy, physiology and pathology. Some provide such instruction; others don't. The time allocated on the syllabus to different subject areas will inevitably differ. In some cases it may be determined by student choice, in others it will be based on an existing course plan.

Questions for college staff

The following is a useful checklist to use when visiting or comparing colleges. We've tried to cover many of these areas in this publication.

- What is the philosophy of the college, and how does it differ from that of other colleges? •
- What are the entrance requirements and procedures for application?
- Are the fees all-inclusive, or are there additional charges, for example for the supervision of • cases or clinics?
- What are these extra fees likely to amount to each year? •
- What is the class size? •
- What resources does the college have? •
- How are students assessed (test, exam, portfolio etc.)? •
- Is there evidence of networking and peer-group support? •
- Is there student representation within the college management? •
- Is there any possibility of interprofessional contact with other ٠ practitioners while at college, or tasters of other therapies?
- In the event of a problem, does the college have a clear • complaints procedure?
- Is time built into the syllabus for business development skills? •
- Is support provided after leaving the college and starting up • in practice?
- Do graduates meet the criteria for entry onto a register • set by the registering bodies?

Questions for college students

When visiting a college, we would strongly recommend that you talk to at least three current students from different year groups, and if possible to graduates too. You might consider asking them the following questions.

- Do students feel that their experience is valued? •
- Do you know all the students in your class/year? •
- Do students and staff relate well to each other? •
- Is student morale high?
- Are the lectures interesting? •
- Is the course well structured? •
- Are lectures and classes well prepared and presented? •
- Are tutors knowledgeable and able to share that knowledge?

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And finally ...

Once you have made your choice and you start studying homeopathy, you are strongly recommended to register as a student member of a professional body. The college you choose will provide information on registering bodies for homeopaths in the UK.

At the time of writing, there are nine registering bodies, including the Alliance of Registered Homeopaths. These bodies are currently all working together, under the auspices of CORH (Council of Organisations Registering Homeopaths), to develop a single register and a scheme of voluntary self-regulation. This is scheduled to come into being in the next two to three years. It is advisable to check that the course you choose will provide you with the necessary skills to be eligible for full registration with one of the professional bodies after you qualify.

Choosing a registering body is like choosing a college: you need to find one that suits you. More information about what the Alliance of Registered Homeopaths offers to its student and full members can be found at our website, www.a-r-h.org (where you can download an application form), or from the ARH office (tel. 08700 736339).

We wish you success with your homeopathic studies, wherever you choose to undertake them, and hope that this booklet will have helped you find the course that's right for you.

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation

To be a confident, *successful self-employed professional* with a good practice. Our practical training is specifically designed to produce confident, competent and capable homoeopaths who have all the skills necessary to set up their own successful practice after graduation.

100% of our graduates practise, because we teach 'Practical Homeopathy'. **Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?** Students have ample opportunities to give feedback, formally and informally either individually or as a group. This enables us to structure the course to their needs and aspirations. A representative of the College is elected to attend the Society of Homeopaths' student meetings.

The opportunity for regular extensive clinical experience with live patients; 'what we teach, we demonstrate practically through homoeopathically cured cases, in the college clinic.'

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

Interest in Complementary Medicine for mature students; and for applicants under 21 years of age, either 'GCSE' or 'A' level.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

- i. Request for a prospectus.
- ii. Sit in on a class or talk to existing students or graduates.
- iii. Complete an application form.
- iv. Come for an informal interview.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Yes.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students? Yes.

How large are the classes for each year group?

Our group sizes are small, approximately ten in each year; which means we devote a lot of time and support to each student and provide personal attention within the class time, as well. Our staffs work to develop excellent relationships with the students.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

- i. Small interactive groups;
- ii. Well-structured four-year curriculum in place and each lecture is accompanied by extensive lecture notes;
- iii. Excellent academic faculty; teachers with worldwide reputation and extensive clinical experience;
- iv. a) 'Allen teaching clinic' a professional teaching clinic for students;b) 'Low cost' clinic with Allen College graduates.

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

• academic training?

Comparative Materia Medica; Clinical therapeutics; Basic medical sciences; Organon and Principles of homoeopathy with latest approach of miasmatic prescribing.

A clear theoretical background is considered essential and this is provided. In order to give the foundation that a working homoeopath needs to underpin their knowledge, the course is both vocational and academic.

• practical training?

Prime emphasis is on Practical training with live cases from the first year.

- i. Initially students observe live case-taking in the Allen Clinic. Then progress to participate in case analysis and prescribing. Later on, students are able to be active in case-taking, prescribing and case management under the supervision of the clinical director. The clinics are enjoyable and inspiring as the students have a consistent exposure to live patients and will fully participate in their treatment. Students witness the changes and cured cases in the college clinic, which gives them immense confidence to practise. Experience has shown us that students begin their patient base and reputation in the third and fourth years of the course when they begin their own consultations with patients under constructive supervision.
- ii. There is plenty of opportunity for clinical discussion and clinical and comparative Materia Medica with remedy differentiation throughout the course.

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

There is Tutors Support Group that meets regularly for continuing professional development.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

- i. There is a comprehensive supervision and tutorial system.
- ii. Excellent support is given throughout the course, students are encouraged to use technology e.g. email and the internet.
- iii. Students are supported by peers, tutors, mentors, a 'buddy' system, and when necessary, one-to-one tuition.
- iv. Our group sizes mean we can give a lot of time and support to each student within class time.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Matters related to self-employment and practice management and business development skills are taught by experts in this field.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Students are encouraged to take their own cases from the third year onwards, with

supervision. Students begin their patient base in the third and fourth years of the course when they begin their own consultations with patients under constructive supervision. Emphasis is on professionalism.

How is students' progress assessed?

Exams - assignments - project presentation - continued peer assessment.

Prime emphasis is on students developing the confidence, self-reflection and insight in prescribing and accordingly review their own progress. This is supported by tutors' assessment of assignments, supervisors' assessments of clinical competence, and feedback from peers and from patients.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

Allen Teaching Clinic, where students sit in with live patients, and Dr Banerjea, Principal of the college, considers and discusses each individual case.

- i. Initially students observe case-taking in the Allen Clinic. Then progress to participate in case analysis and prescribing. Later on, students are able to be active in case-taking, prescribing and case management under the supervision of the clinical director. The clinics are enjoyable and inspiring as the students have a consistent exposure to live patients and will fully participate in their treatment.
- ii. There is plenty of opportunity for clinical discussion and clinical and comparative Materia Medica with remedy differentiation throughout the course.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

Minimum of 200 hours of clinical experience from teaching clinics plus 200 hours of supervised cases.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

Partly - some from supervised cases.

How is clinical performance assessed?

Assessment monitored through clinical discussion. Constructive feedback is given in the 'Allen Teaching Clinic'.

When does clinical training begin?

From Year 1.

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1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

We hope that students will have achieved a thorough grounding in the practice and philosophy of homeopathy and that, through the careful guidance of their tutors, they will be competent and confident to begin the rest of their journey and practise as successful homeopaths.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? Students complete a feedback form each month. These forms are evaluated and tutors made aware of students' issues. Where there is a problem, we liaise directly with the student and look for a professional compromise.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

The ANM has been training therapists for over twenty years and our homeopathy course is in-depth, producing competent, confident practitioners whose skills include diet and nutrition, counselling skills and anatomy and physiology in addition to a broad-based homeopathic education.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

Candidates under the age of twenty-one require five GCSE passes (or equivalent), plus one A level. These candidates will also be interviewed.

Mature candidates are interviewed to assess their potential for study and as future practitioners. Emphasis is placed on the maturity, attitude and temperament of the applicant, together with the ability to communicate fluently, rather than on academic qualifications alone.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Applicants are required to complete an application form, attend an informal interview during which their motives and suitability will be assessed and they can find out more about anything they wish to know. They are required to provide two referees and copies of any qualifications they may have. If accepted for study, they will be informed in writing and be asked to pay their fee.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Whenever possible. Some applicants come forward during the summer, during the course vacation.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students?

Existing students are happy to respond to any queries.

How large are the classes for each year group?

Generally speaking, four to ten people.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

The course is currently held at a Community Centre with easy access to the A14 trunk road and very good free parking facilities. Rooms are large and well-lit and the surroundings are pleasant. There is the opportunity for students to make their own refreshments. Teaching aids include overhead projector, whiteboards and flip charts.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Part-time only.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

£1850 pa for the first three years. £600 for the fourth year. Students paying in instalments will pay an additional £100 per year.

Are there any additional charges during the course?

Additional occasional days are offered during Years Two and Three to cover specific topics such as paediatrics, and an additional charge is made for these.

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

• academic training?

More emphasis on academic training in Year One. However, students take part in live casetaking and assessment at the end of Year One and this continues through Years Two and Three. Many lectures are based on the treatment and management of actual cases.

• practical training?

See above. We believe in training homeopaths who are ready to practise.

another area? (If so, please give details.)

We include modules in Counselling Skills and Diet & Nutrition.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

Anatomy, physiology and pathology are studied in Years One to Three, including case-taking and the structure of the NHS. Some diagnostic testing skills are taught, such as blood pressure testing.

How long is a full-time course?

n/a

How long is a part-time course?

Years One, Two and Three consist of ten full weekends per year, plus occasional extra lecture days in Years Two and Three. Students are expected to complete homework set and reach a minimum mark of 60% to receive a pass. Year Four consists of a dissertation (minimum 5000 words), 10 case studies, 5 acute cases, 50 hours clinical practice observing a qualified homeopath, and a site visit by a tutor to observe the student homeopath treating a minimum of three live cases.

Are courses other than homeopathy available?

A wide range of courses run by ANM tutors in various locations throughout the UK. Courses include Anatomy & Physiology, Aromatherapy, Counselling Skills, Hopi Ear Candling, Hypnotherapy, Indian Head Massage, Non-manipulative Skeletal Re-alignment, Progressive Kinesiology, Reflexology, Reiki, Therapeutic Massage.

Are combined courses available?

The ANM homeopathy course combines Diet & Nutrition, Counselling Skills and A&P modules.

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

We hold regular tutor meetings, liaise via e-mail and telephone and have an annual tutor CPD training workshop.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

The Course Co-Ordinator monitors students' feedback via forms filled in after each course weekend. Students may approach the Course Co-Ordinator with issues in which they do not want to involve tutors. At the beginning of Year One, students are made aware that tutors will do everything possible to support them with study problems. The course includes a counselling skills module and students are able to work on personal issues during this module. CPD is a condition of Registered Membership of the ANM, and students are encouraged to attend the CPD days organised during the year. Tutors are available for email support and organised tutorials and constructive feedback is given on all marked homework and assignments.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? The course includes a marketing and book-keeping day during Year Three.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Students begin by observing case-taking and management as a class at the end of Year One, progressing to supervised case-taking and management as a class during Year Two. Students are encouraged to build a practice with supervised cases during Year Three.

How is students' progress assessed?

Through homework set (pass mark 60%) each month, tutor assessment, and examination at the end of Years One, Two and Three. Year Four is a post-graduate year, involving a dissertation (minimum 5000 words), 10 chronic and 5 acute cases, 50 hours clinical practice observing approved homeopaths, and a site visit to allow a tutor to observe the student in practice.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

This includes live case-taking and management on selected study days, students' own supervised cases, and an additional 50 hours clinical practice in the final year.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

This is under review, but currently approximately 200 hours.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

Not necessarily. All clinical training hours will be subject to supervision.

How is clinical performance assessed?

Peer group review and tutor assessment of supervised written-up cases.

When does clinical training begin?

Towards the end of the First Year.

6. INFORMATION ABOUT GRADUATES

Please note: The figures are lower than usual during these years because there was a break in the course when we transferred the venue from Essex to Suffolk. Previous to this the usual intake was between 8 and 16. We anticipate numbers of students increasing as the course is established in its new venue in Suffolk.

Nearly half of all applicants are GPs, veterinary surgeons, dentists and pharmacists. Minimum requirement is a good general education.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Submit enrolment form after reading the free Prospectus, with copies of certificates where appropriate.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes?

Introductory course available by distance learning, or first aid courses in adult colleges throughout the country. Regular Seminars are held worldwide from basic level to postgraduate.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students?

Yes, worldwide personal introductions, online study group and regular seminars.

How large are the classes for each year group?

n/a

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

Home study, one-to-one contact with expert tutor via letter, email, fax, telephone, library. Regular newsletters. Seminars. CD ROM, video, audiotape, CD, DVD, hard copy.

Do you offer an option of full or part-time courses?

All teaching staff possess recognised qualifications in their subjects. They include doctors, teachers, veterinary surgeons, dentists and pharmacists. What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation? That they will be a competent homeopathic practitioner.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? Yes, each year has two student representatives and there is a student/staff officer.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

The college now offers a BSc(Hons) degree validated by Middlesex University which trains students in both classical and practical homeopathy.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

The Centre prefers applicants to have a minimum standard of five GCSEs or O-levels and two A-levels. However, most students have in place sufficient previous work and life experience to cover our entry requirements and are encouraged to apply on this basis.

The most important factors for the Centre are that the applicant:

- has a commitment and enthusiasm to study homeopathy
- has the ability to develop the necessary theoretical and practical skills to become a homeopath
- is sufficiently open minded to take on board challenging ideas

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

Our courses are primarily designed for those who want to become homeopathic practitioners. CPH offers a practical approach, effective teaching methods and excellent clinic facilities. Its purpose is to give all its students/practitioners the very best therapeutic tools. We focus on developing genuine clinical skills and believe that the earlier in the course the

clinical exposure begins, the quicker students become capable and competent homeopaths.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?

Yes, students have ample opportunities to give feedback, either individually or as a group. This helps us structure the course to their needs and aspirations.

Our 'practical' training is specifically designed to produce confident, competent and capable homeopaths that are able to set up their own successful practices after graduation.

No, we are looking primarily looking for enthusiasm, life experience and willingness to learn. What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

We are the only college in London to have its office, clinics and teaching rooms in the one building. (This makes a huge difference to morale and enthusiasm amongst students and staff.) We have a library and resources centre with computerised repertories and a broadband internet connection for research. We have excellent tutors, administrative support, make good use of information communication technology, excellent clinic facilities and space for tutorials and supervision.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Yes - we offer a two-year full-time course, a part-time four-year course and Post-Graduate courses in Homeopathy and Iridology.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

The fees for the year 2005-2006 are:

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

A passion for homoeopathy. The ability to confidently go into the world successfully treating sick people. More happiness than when they started the course.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? Yes. We have several different levels of representation and feedback, both formal and informal.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

We offer a practical training in homoeopathy, which includes classical methods and we strongly encourage anyone interested in the course to sit in on a teaching day and meet us.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

No. Life experience and a passion for the subject are much more important than previous academic achievement. We do not consider ourselves able to predict at the beginning of a four-year course who is going to make it as a practitioner. We have trained some unlikely people from all walks of life who have turned into excellent practitioners. The first year of the course is a well-rounded and practical introduction during which time students can discover if homoeopathy is for them before committing to the rest of the professional practitioner training.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Familiarisation with us and the course. Informal meetings/interview.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Yes. Very much encouraged.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students? Yes. Also very much encouraged.

Between 15 and 30 students but clinical training is in much smaller groups.

No. Experience shows that someone can know it all and still not be a good homoeopath.

practical training?

Yes. This is about actually doing it and making it work. We find students learn most by doing it in practice in an environment where they feel confident in uncertainty and in their ability to obtain support when they need it.

another area? (If so, please give details.)

Personal development and learning how to network are also vital. Self discovery/awareness, review of fixed ideas/beliefs need to be facilitated and supported. A homoeopath is something you become, not something you know.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

We use home study training courses produced by Alternative Training specifically for alternative practitioners to cover these areas. This is supplemented by in-class training in key areas. Various sources of support are available and students can cover the material at their own speed. Some take the full four years to do it, others have done it all in a month! Exemption from the anatomy and physiology modules is possible for those with previous qualifications in this area.

We have a support network and system of graded support from peers, more experienced buddies, mentors, tutors, teachers and college staff right up to the Principal. When needed we use personal tutors too. Pastoral care is available in person at all college weekends and by phone at other times.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Yes. Many students need help to feel confident in this area.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Strongly encouraged from day 1. Homoeopathy is very safe and students learn most by doing it. We give simple guidance to enable students to know when to ask for help and how to get it.

How is students' progress assessed?

We aim to help students know for themselves how they are progressing. Students keep a self-reflective journal to aid this process. We observe students' progress through classes, cases, regular interviews and during supervised group clinics. We also get feedback from sitting in time with practitioners. Students submit six graduation cases during the final two years of the course on which they get detailed feedback. We get to know each student individually over the four years of the course.

Students are encouraged to start using homoeopathy right from the start of the course. From the third year students attend the student group clinic which offers excellent opportunities to gain clinical skills and confidence in practice. When does clinical training begin?

When the student is ready. For most this will be during the first year. All students will be taking cases during the first year even if all are not prescribing. All students will be prescribing by the end of the second year and student group clinics start in year 3.

We hope that students will have developed the confidence and competence to work as independent professionals, within the context of a willingness to undertake ongoing CPD and supervision.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? Yes, each year group appoints a student representative to liaise initially with the Principal and Registrar, and then if relevant with other members of staff.

Under the personal guidance of our team of highly experienced homeopaths, students will receive a broad and well balanced training in both the theory and practice of homeopathy, ensuring they graduate with both the confidence and competence to go directly into practice.

No, intake decisions are made on an individual basis taking into account both life experience as well as formal educational background.

Besides the college clinic, that ensures students gain a high level of practical experience, we also provide a small on-site library and ex-students who offer help with acquisition of text books and remedies. As a part-time course facilities are necessarily limited though we work hard to ensure our students are well supported and informed.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

The only professional course option we offer is four-year part-time attendance (one weekend per month) plus home study as we feel this ensures students have adequate time to fully evolve their understanding and practice of this complex discipline. We do however allow people to complete just the first year of the course if they are simply looking to get a good basic grounding in home use and further their interest. We are also planning one-day and weekend courses.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

Annual fees for 2004/5 are currently £1999 including VAT which includes ten college

weekends plus the home study course material. Text books are not included. Fees can be paid in instalments.

Students must purchase their own textbooks and pay for external supervision in their final two years.

Our core team of staff are available to assist students with any aspect of their studies. We also have a tutorial system and students can receive an individual tutor for specific aspects such as anatomy and physiology if required.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? We incorporate lectures on 'Running a Successful Practice' into the course and all our lecturers are successful practitioners who are happy to offer support and advice.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Students are not expected to prescribe without supervision or to make charges for consultation other than to cover supervision fees and remedy costs.

Apart from the Anatomy & Physiology assignments our First-year students are not assessed, assignments and tests are given for guidance only. From the Second year onwards assignments and tests are formally assessed and students are given individual feedback. In the Third and Fourth years students are required to take and submit cases for review by our Cases Tutor.

The college operates a student clinic that is staffed by two Fourth years under guidance of the Senior Clinicians, who are highly experienced practising homeopaths. Our students are all from overseas and do not speak English as their first language. While we always remain sensitive to their language needs, there is no compromise in the quality of the homeopathic education we provide. We hope that upon graduation our students feel they have received a training as comprehensive and enabling as at any other college in the UK.

All students are involved at every level of decision-making within the school.

We believe that ISHL offers overseas students an opportunity to study homeopathy in the UK at a level that enables them to become confident and effective practitioners, and which would not otherwise be available to them.

No. Prior academic achievement is not considered a necessary condition for homeopathic training.

We ask our students to engage in a process of self-reflection and enquiry about why they want to study homeopathy at ISHL and what they hope to achieve. Because circumstances prevent us from interviewing all our applicants in person, we ask them to document this process and share it with us.

Currently five students in our first intake, with an intended maximum of ten to twelve per group.

Our biggest assets are our dedicated and enthusiastic teachers, a strong sense of community and support within the School and a flexible, forward-looking ethos. We have a small library and encourage students to use the internet extensively. ISHL is a registered Course Provider with the Department for Education and Skills, so overseas students can get visas for entry to the UK.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Full-time only (overseas students can't get a visa for part-time courses).

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses? Currently £4950 per annum for the full-time course (June 2005).

Our students take the Alternative Training medical sciences module, at a current one-time cost of £590.

Supervision prior to graduation comes to around £900, although most if not all of this should be absorbed by the student charging the patient and passing the fee on to the supervisor.

We believe that homeopathy is a living subject that should not exclusively be studied in a classroom or even a clinic. The best kind of learning is experiential - we cannot know our remedies unless we understand how they look and function in the natural world, and we cannot really understand our patients until we have first gone some way to knowing ourselves.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

Students must complete the Alternative Training courses in anatomy and physiology, pathology and disease, unless they have a prior medical qualification. They are guided through them by our Head of Holistic Human Sciences.

How long is a full-time course?

Three years.

Our course is very eclectic and already includes flower essences, nutrition and herbal tinctures. How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

Core teaching team: annual residential training for three days. Regular meetings, funded courses where applicable, guest teachers, evening tutors, bi-annual meetings. Staff co-ordinators on management team.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

Every student attends a monthly tutor group. There is also telephone case support, and a member of staff in each area who can be contacted at designated times every week for support. There is always a student supporter in college. The graduates offer a mentoring scheme for current students.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Our course includes training in practitioner skills, and practice management, and we encourage students to undertake additional training where necessary, and we facilitate this. What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training?

We encourage it, with support and supervision.

How is students' progress assessed?

In many ways - through their personal learning journal which they build over three years, through personal and clinical tutor reports, from regular individual feedback sessions, by self assessment, and from observations of their contributions in class and in clinic. Assessment is continuous and informal.

From the 2nd year, students join one of our supervised clinics, where they initially observe and take part in case analysis. Later, they participate fully in case-taking, analysis and prescription under the full supervision of the clinical tutor. At least 100, but we monitor in terms of input rather than hours.

Mostly, and we consider individual skills and circumstances.

Firstly, by an experienced practitioner, and secondly from written presented cases.

When does clinical training begin?

At the start of the course, and in clinical setting from the beginning of the second year.

On completion of the licentiate course, we hope - and expect - that our graduates will be able to practise competently, confidently, and profitably. They will also be able to continue their studies within the framework of the University of Greenwich's BSc course in Complementary Medicine if they want, because the licentiate will supply 180 credits towards it.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? Yes.

This is a unique opportunity to study and learn 21st-century homeopathy using up-to-date knowledge and technology, and exciting new learning methods, in a wonderful environment.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

No. Each applicant is considered on the basis of their life experience and willingness to study, but a good command of spoken and written English is necessary.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Every prospective new entrant is invited to spend an informal day at college with us, after which, if they complete an application form, they would be formally interviewed.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Yes, both, and also open days are held where inquirers can talk to the principals and lecturers, and sample presentations are given.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students? Yes.

How large are the classes for each year group?

We are committed to a high staff-to-student ratio.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

Our classes are held in historic old buildings on the campus of the University of Greenwich. The classrooms have every modern teaching facility and full disabled access, and there are cafés and restaurants on site. The site is spectacular in itself and close to cafés, bookshops, pubs, transport, and accommodation if necessary. Close by is our office, where clinics are held - we have a library, and computers which students can use, either for internet use or for using homeopathic software. As we get increasing integration with the University of Greenwich, their facilities will become available to our students.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Our course is technically a full-time course, but is held at weekends, with clinics held on a weekday for the final year. There are 15 weekends a year for three years.

Are there any additional charges during the course?

Very few. There are some essential books to be bought, but we encourage students to use the internet and read online. A one-day first aid course must be undertaken at some point.

Our course provides a good balance of theoretical and practical training - you can't have one without the other - and it provides plenty of opportunity for personal growth.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

The Human Sciences module is taught throughout the three years. It is a unique course, specially written for us in order to integrate the study of anatomy and physiology with homeopathy.

How long is a full-time course?

Three years (45 weekends).

How long is a part-time course?

Are courses other than homeopathy available?

No.

Are combined courses available?

Our course can be taken at the same time as the BSc in Complementary Medicine at the University of Greenwich, and would count for 180 credits (half the required number for the degree).

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

There is a range of opportunities available through the university for staff to continue their professional development. Since much of what we are teaching is breaking new ground, we encourage staff to sit in on one another's lectures and develop in that way. We also provide opportunities for peer supervision and mentoring.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

Every student is allocated a personal tutor. Since our groups are small, it is possible for the staff and the principals to monitor progress very closely and offer help to any student who has difficulties or special needs. Study is supported by a website on which material for lectures/discussion groups is posted to help with learning between college sessions, and an interactive site is in construction.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Yes. In the final year students learn how to set up and run a practice, and shown how to access business support schemes.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Students practise as appropriate to their level. In Level One they can treat people needing short-term treatment . At some point during Level Two they begin to take more serious cases under supervision, and in Level Three they have their own caseload, both in the college clinic and outside.

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

To have developed and adopted a self-reflective and professional manner of working as a homoeopathic practitioner. To achieve the requirements for registration where desired. To realise an empathy with their patients. To have an inquisitive approach to further knowledge and skills for self-development.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?

Yes, there is a nominated student (who may be an undergraduate or a postgraduate student maintaining ties to the classes as part of continual development) as a point of contact for other students and the administration. Furthermore the administration is approachable and any student may submit proposals for course and syllabus development or delivery.

Generally we feel students make their decision to attend our course upon reflection of their own biography and understanding of spirituality - the result is that this course manifests to the student when he/she is ready for it.

There are recommendations rather than strict requirements, i.e. a basic school education with some sciences and English language comprehension. It is acknowledged that many students will have had a significant gap between education and this course, and the syllabus attempts to work from basic principles.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Applicants should enquire, by email, telephone, writing or fax, to receive a pack of course brochure, introductory letter, application form and course dates. Further questions may be asked of the college principal by the prospective applicant. Upon receipt of the application form the college makes contact with a view to interview - which may be possible by telephone where students enrol at short notice or have difficulty travelling to the centre. Students may enrol after the start of the course (academic start is September each year), but generally only up till January due to the workload required to catch up.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Applicants may visit the college and sit in during an existing weekend class to decide if this is the right course for them. Usually the classes best suited for attending are the existing first-vear classes.

Yes, applicants may contact current students and postgraduates. A contact list is provided on request. Applicants may of course discuss the course when meeting other students during any class attendance.

Generally the number is between eight and 25 students per year group, the wide variability due to intake numbers. The maximum student number for an intake currently stands at approximately 35 students in view of room capacity.

There is a large first-floor teaching room with a book collection for library and sales. Repertories and materia medicas are available for reference use. Teaching resources used include plastic anatomical models, PC powerpoint slide shows, pharmacy stock for remedy manufacture and provings. This is a well-equipped lab area with large remedy collections of dry herbs, herbs in tincture, homoeopathic medicants, crystals, essences of flower, crystal and star remedies. Remedies are available for purchase as well as for practical experience during class.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

At present there is only a part-time course facility comprising of ten weekends per year, with weekday clinic attendance. This course lasts four years, although students with a prior course

record may enrol at an appropriate point into the course at the discretion of the principal. Postgraduate students studying this course as part of their continuing professional development may also reduce the overall period to less than four years.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

The course is charged at £850 per year. Students may easily budget for their training as fees may be paid by standing order or cheque/cash instalments.

Are there any additional charges during the course?

Extra charges apply for books, audiotapes and remedies, where students purchase these as desired. There are various voluntary retreats and trips during the course, for which students pay costs such as travel and subsistence, but no extra teaching fees.

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

An equal emphasis is placed on each of these three areas.

• academic training?

There is basic anatomy, physiology, pathology and medicine, with teaching supported by visual aids, slideshows and plastic models. The principles of homoeopathy, materia medica, repertory, basic principles of allied therapies (herbalism, flower essences, crystals, craniosacral skills, astrology, Chinese medicine) are covered.

• practical training?

This includes opportunities for provings of remedies, manufacture and pharmacy practice, cases, slideshows and seeing patients.

another area? (If so, please give details.)

Research is encouraged and some students have chosen to write a thesis on their selected topic. New remedies made during the school year are undergoing provings research, for which a number of students are collating data for future publication. Spiritual development is fostered through meditation and self-enquiry, and feedback is available from the tutors where appropriate. There are various trips to provide opportunities for spiritual work, such as to sacred sites in Egypt, Rosslyn chapel etc. Trips are made to the Natural History Museum, British Museum and Kew Gardens to provide on-site teaching.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

This subject takes up an integral part of the course, especially during the first year when basic pathology is studied. Nonetheless the medicine is taught in an easily understood manner with the perspective of anthroposophy, Chinese medicine and esoteric science.

How long is a full-time course?

At present the course is part-time.

How long is a part-time course?

Four years, with ten seminar weekends each year (Saturday and Sunday 11am to 5.30pm sessions). Additionally the clinic sit-ins occur each week for students to enlist into by a rota system, and trips/day visits occur periodically throughout the year.

Are courses other than homeopathy available?

Not at the moment. Postgraduate meetings occur several times a year for graduates to maintain their professional and personal development. Informal provings groups have been organised, where students also practise spiritual journeying and meditation.

Are combined courses available?

The undergraduate course stands alone at present.

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

Teaching materials, books and IT equipment can be easily purchased where funds permit.

Where tutors wish to attend conferences/workshops for their own development and continual professional development then the administration will fund this at its discretion. A network of therapists have enabled tutors to share healing and therapy sessions for maintaining good health of mind, body and spirit.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

A pastoral care officer has been nominated for students to contact where desired. During classes students are taught healing techniques which they are able to practise and share in a supportive environment during class, which has facilitated greater group support. The principal is at hand to provide support where needed (including with homoeopathic treatment if appropriate). Students are able to maintain contact with the administration after graduation for mentoring support.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Yes. Ethics and medico-legal skills are covered during the course. Further topics include basic book-keeping, clinic management, pharmacy skills and portfolio development for registration and continual professional development.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? This is encouraged from the first year and in as safe a manner as possible. Therefore students are encouraged to take a good case and learn to present this at class or to the tutors individually - for supervised prescribing in the early stages. Later the student can continue presenting cases after their own initial prescribing. Furthermore new homoeopathic remedies undergo proving by students and later may be used in clinical prescribing after discussion with the tutors. Remedies are available through the school as medicated pilules and tinctures.

How is students' progress assessed?

Each student is encouraged to keep a portfolio and diary of spiritual development or selfreflective practice. This is not a mandatory requirement. Periodically there are written exams, with multiple choice questions, short answer questions and slide shows. Each student is given feedback as to their use of healing techniques. The college ethos is that assessment is based on empowering the student and facilitating their personal insight.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

Embedded within the seminar theory classes are exercises in case analysis, clinical slideshows (of pathology and patients' signs), live cases with patients attending class and opportunities for student case presentations. Students can sign in for clinic sit-ins with the tutors' clinics during the week, depending on the patient bookings and availability. Provings and manufacturing of remedies from mother tincture and through succussion and trituration occur several times each year, both during class and within student support groups outside of the classes. During each class there are sessions of meditation and healing, both for self-development and to train in patient healing skills. Students are encouraged to see their own patients with mentoring opportunities, leading to unsupervised practice by the end of the course.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

Students are expected to reach 150 hours of clinical training, which also presently meets their requirements for professional registration. However, it is recognised that a strict number of hours cannot meet the training requirements of each student, as each student has their own learning and experiential curve. A flexible approach is allowed whereby students may continue their clinical training after academic graduation and thereby finalise their training

and also meet prospective registration requirements.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

No, students can include time spent with unsupervised cases, as long as these are properly documented and presented to the tutors, who may nonetheless suggest further cases are required to meet training criteria. A reasonable guota of the time can be measured from time spent on remedy provings, as well as situations where patients are presented and treated in class with shared feedback from all the students

How is clinical performance assessed?

Clinical performance is assessed in several ways. Through students' presentations of their cases during and between classes. Through students sitting in the tutor clinics and being encouraged to take part in the discussion, including being able to provide their own recommendations/advice to the patient. Through sharing of healing techniques amongst students during the classes the students are in effect assessing each other in a supportive environment

When does clinical training begin?

This begins both when students are ready and generally from the first year with clinical pathology slideshows and tutor case presentations of live patients in classes. It is provided more formally from the third year onward when students have greater opportunity to sit in the tutor clinics

The college provides a very flexible approach to the learning and teaching of homoeopathy. Therefore students have opted out of classes for a discretionary period for reasons such as sickness, travel, childcare etc., and then returned to the course when they are ready again. To facilitate this the course fees payable are placed on hold and missed classes can be attended by joining other intake years' classes (each intake year class is held on a different weekend and hence enables this). Furthermore any student may revise subjects by re-attending classes of other years. The point of graduation can be extended at the discretion of the administration to enable a student to improve on weak areas.

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

A sound theoretical basis in philosophy and materia medica. An ability to recognise what needs to be cured in a case and to apply philosophy, materia medica and knowledge of medical science to devise an effective homoeopathic treatment. An ability to hold a therapeutic relationship.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? There are open staff/student meetings.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

We work intensively in small groups to nurture the individual student, starting formally with theory in the first year then proceeding in such a way that by the fourth year the student is able to set his/her own learning objectives and have these serviced by the college staff.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

There are four criteria: an ability to function academically at a tertiary education level, a broad base work experience that includes working with people, an ability to communicate, a working plan showing they have given thought and organised how they will get through the four years.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

After sending in an application form and £50 deposit, the potential student is interviewed by staff members.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Yes.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students? Yes.

How large are the classes for each year group?

They should be no more than 12 but may be as low as 6.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

There is a tutoring and buddy scheme in Years One and Two. In Years Three and Four students have an individual Tutor. Each year has course booklets full of lecture notes and in Years Two and Three discussion papers. There is a good library facility for which we charge £20 per year which is used to add books which staff and students choose. There is a Students Clinic and we run two free clinics in the local community, one for children, where students can get experience working with cases. Staff are trained in supervision. All staff, including medical sciences, are experienced practitioners and teachers.

In Years Three and Four we offer extra classes in diet, counselling, child development and whatever the student requires to manage/or understand the maintaining cause and to develop therapeutic skills.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

We started as a full-time college and still offer this but are now basically part-time with some correspondence in Year One (because of the far-flung nature of Scotland).

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses? £1800 per year. No hidden or extra charges for supervision, etc. – except library fee. Are there any additional charges during the course? Only library fee.

Years Two and Three involve much Case Analysis in class using paper cases and video. There are two practical years training in a clinic from Year Three. The First Year involves sitting in with a teacher who will then discuss the case thoroughly, taking 30 cases for practice, and taking and treating six cases with a supervisor. It is the aim to develop interview skills and observation techniques, and to recognise symptoms. In the Second Year the student is expected to treat at least 10 cases. The aim is to recognise what needs to be cured, to apply

knowledge of philosophy and medical sciences and to devise a suitable homoeopathic treatment for the patient, and to manage the case. At this stage the supervisor and the peer group are there for support and consultation.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to araduate?

How long is a piece of string? They probably do 300 hours at least.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

In class and in supervised clinics.

How is clinical performance assessed?

By submission of casework and presentation of cases. And by supervisor report.

When does clinical training begin?

Year Two in theory. Year Three in hands on.

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

Competence as practitioners, secure and confident in their knowledge and skills. Enthusiastic lifelong learners.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?

Yes, students contribute through membership of various liaison committees at various levels throughout the length of the course.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

The University of Central Lancashire degree course represents the most cost-effective route to a recognised academic/professional qualification in homeopathy, with all the resources that the sixth largest university in the UK can offer, taught in a friendly environment by knowledgeable and approachable staff.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

For students under 21, yes. For mature students, life experience and enthusiasm for homeopathy is taken into account.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Via the UCAS system for full-time applications and through the admissions office for parttime applications.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? Regularly offered throughout the year.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students? We encourage this!

How large are the classes for each year group?

It depends on the subject. In pathway specific (i.e. homeopathic modules), sizes range from 15 to 25. In generic modules (i.e. Health, Holism & Healing, Counselling Skills, Therapeutic Relationship, Research), you could find yourself in a class of up to 40 or 50 students part of the time.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

Halls of residence, purpose-built skills labs, full audio-visual support, teaching clinic, normal lecture rooms, a university library containing in excess of £7000 worth of homeopathic books, friendly, experienced, skilled staff, who are qualified teachers as well as registered practitioners, and university-wide student support services (including Advisory and Counselling Centre, Health Centre, Multi-Faith Centre, Pre-School Centre and a Sports Centre which includes a multi-million pound recreation facility).

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses? Both.

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

- academic training?
- practical training?

The course has an equal emphasis on both academic and practical training. You are currently required to complete 250 hours of practical work based in the teaching clinic and in the classroom, and take responsibility for patients through 30 visits (ten patients, three visits each).

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

The course provides sufficient grounding in orthodox medical sciences to enable its students to understand medical diagnosis, dialogue with other health professionals, and be aware of danger signs and symptoms on behalf of their clients.

How long is a full-time course?

Three years.

How long is a part-time course?

Five years

Are courses other than homeopathy available?

The university offers a suite of complementary medicine courses including Homeopathic Medicine, Therapeutic Massage, Herbal Medicine and Health Sciences for Complementary Medicine. There is an option to study for an Advanced University Certificate as a Bach Flower Practitioner.

Are combined courses available?

No, however the Bach Flower Practitioner course is a stand-alone course and may be combined with the others in Year Three full time.

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

The university system provides staff with access to a wide range of training opportunities. In the case of the current homeopathy team, two of us are studying for PhDs, one has just completed a graduate-level professional qualification in person-centred counselling. All of these studies will enable us to bring additional skills back into our homeopathic teaching.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

Students have access to personal tutors who stay with them over the duration of the course. In addition they have dissertation (research) and Guided Case mentorship in Year 3. There are also a range of mechanisms to support students with disabilities, and to support students experiencing financially or emotionally challenging times. There is also a system of student feedback to teachers, module and course leaders, and an active homeopathy society bringing in guest lecturers.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Yes, a specific module addresses this in Year 3.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Students practise under supervision during their guided Cases Programme, once they have demonstrated their competence in Years 1 and 2 (full time).

How is students' progress assessed?

In a variety of ways. Assignments may require essays to be written, group work to be presented in class, portfolios of work to be assembled, cases to be taken and submitted, or, rarely, examinations to be sat.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

Our clinical training is unique and integrated with all aspects of the course. It looks at both the theory and practice of homeopathy in the clinical environment, links this with the development of therapeutic skills and understanding, and provides opportunities for students to engage with all sorts of skills practice.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

250.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

A mix of clinic-based, classroom-based and individual experience is required.

How is clinical performance assessed?

By reflective essays and supervised cases.

When does clinical training begin?

In year 1.

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

Our graduates obtain a dual qualification of a BSc Honours degree (Health Sciences: Homoeopathy) and a Licence to Practise. They attain a sound understanding of homoeopathic philosophy and considerable experience of treating patients in our innovative teaching clinic and NHS placement. We have a proven track record of supporting graduates to become successful, confident, self-aware, professional homoeopaths.

The dual qualification of BSc Honours degree and Licence to Practise also enables our graduates to take up other employment opportunities in the field of homoeopathy and complementary and alternative medicine generally (including teaching, practising in the NHS, journal editing, software marketing and studying for higher qualifications).

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?

Yes. Each year group has elected representatives to provide formal and informal feedback. The homoeopathy team place importance on seeking and responding to student input.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

This, the first homoeopathic degree course in Europe, offers publicly funded education in homoeopathy which is focused on integrating the study of philosophy with practical student learning in our teaching clinic, and is located within the School of Integrated Health which leads the way in offering the most comprehensive range of courses in complementary and alternative medicine (CAM) in the UK, providing a unique interprofessional learning environment fostering high-level practitioner skills not only in homoeopathy but also practitioner development and health sciences.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

Yes. If under 21 years old, two A2 levels at grade C or above (to include biology) or equivalent are required. If over 21, a system of accreditation of prior learning is used. Your motivation, self-awareness and ability to reflect will be taken into consideration alongside formal qualifications. We advise on pre-course preparation where necessary.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Contact our Admissions office or visit the website for the University prospectus which provides details of the UCAS (University Central Admissions Service) procedure for full-time applications and the University admissions procedure for part-time applications. Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes?

There are opportunities throughout the year to observe classes and to attend open days and selection workshops.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students? Yes during visits.

How large are the classes for each year group?

Up to 25 students.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

All teaching and clinics take place at the purpose-built and well-equipped Cavendish Campus site in central London. The University Polyclinic is the largest multidisciplinary teaching clinic in Europe offering subsidised appointments attracting patients from all social backgrounds with a wide variety of presenting complaints. There are full library facilities both on site and available electronically, supported by the services of a dedicated librarian. Over the last ten years we have built up an extensive collection of homoeopathic books and journals. The full range of student services includes educational, career, welfare, housing, childcare and social.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Both full- and part-time course - weekday, daytime attendance.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

Full-time: £1275 (LEA funding and student loans available)

Part-time fee calculated depending on the number of modules studied each year. Full details from the Admissions Office.

Are there any additional charges during the course?

A subsided fee for a certificated first aid course. All clinical education and insurance costs are included.

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

- academic training?
- practical training?

The focus of this practice-orientated course is on student learning in our teaching clinic. Clinical participation runs throughout the course from guided observation to supervised practice. Minimum 300 hours in clinic including placement with homoeopath working in the NHS.

• another area? (If so, please give details.)

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

Five modules in health sciences (the course is comprised of a total of 24 modules) taught by experts in the field who also share a sound appreciation of complementary and alternative medicine (CAM) with many being CAM practitioners themselves. The course prepares graduates to enter homoeopathic practice with the skills necessary to discuss disease process in terms of orthodox medicine, to recognise strengths and limitations of different therapeutic systems, and to be able to work collaboratively with other healthcare practitioners.

How long is a full-time course?

Three years full-time.

How long is a part-time course?

Five years part-time.

Are courses other than homeopathy available?

Yes. The Department provides the most comprehensive range of courses in complementary and alternative medicine (CAM) in the UK including herbal medicine, acupuncture, bodywork and nutritional therapy. In addition there are a wide range of undergraduate, postgraduate and short courses in the areas of interprofessional education in healthcare, community development and social work. The latter includes a diploma course for practitioners wishing

to study health science modules to update and refresh their knowledge and skills. Are combined courses available?

A first-year module explores a full range of complementary and alternative therapies and there are opportunities to observe a range of other therapies in the teaching clinics. Graduates are welcome to return to complete a Graduate Diploma by studying modules in another therapeutic approach (e.g. nutritional therapy, herbal medicine, bodywork) leading to practitioner status.

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

Continuing professional development is a key aspect of a university teaching post. The homoeopathy team, all of whom are practising homoeopaths, participate in personal and professional development activities within the Department and University. Team members are also undertaking a PGCE, PhD, Massimo Mangialavori's course and a postgraduate homoeopathy course, as well as presenting papers at conferences. We also recognise that clinical supervision is an essential element of effective practice and meet regularly for peer supervision.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

Each new student is paired with a homoeopathy team member who acts as their Personal Tutor. Throughout the course regular meetings take place between the student and their Personal Tutor. Module Leaders and Course Leaders are also available for guidance as and when needed. In the final year there is one-to-one supervision for clinical cases and project. The University's Counselling and Advice Service offers one-to-one support and advice for students experiencing personal difficulties.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Yes. A final-year module is devoted to preparing setting up in practice. This module offers guidance on business and practice management including financial, planning, legal, taxation and insurance matters. In addition professional homoeopaths share their experience of successful practice development including marketing and PR.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? Students practise under supervision in the final year of the course which is fully insured through the University. Where students already hold qualifications from a previous course in homoeopathy, they continue to practise.

How is students' progress assessed?

The course uses a modular structure, whereby each module is assessed and the credits awarded are accumulated throughout the course. A full range of methods of assessment are used including group work, presentations, portfolios, reflective papers, essays, leaflets, projects, tests and timed papers. The assessment programme is also designed to develop students' higher education and career management skills. Students are able to make a second submission on all work if a pass is not achieved at the first attempt.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

The focus of this practice-orientated course is on student learning in our teaching clinic. We integrate learning in clinic with classroom sessions. Guided observation commences in the first semester of the course, this leads on to taking responsibility for patient liaison in the second year and by the third year students are running the clinic under supervision. To facilitate a smooth transition into professional practice, students gain considerable experience

in treating patients in the teaching clinic as well as in 'private' supervised practice. The placement with a homoeopath working in an NHS surgery broadens students' experience. Developing practitioner skills in clinic is supported by learning in interprofessional groups in the practitioner development modules.

Minimum 300 hours, provided in the University Polyclinic and in supervision.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

Yes, both within the University Polyclinic and in your own setting under supervision.

By clinic portfolio (supervised cases, reflective paper, observed clinical participation, case taking self-assessment).

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

We aim for our graduates to be competent, confident, safe, ethical, reflective and enthusiastic homoeopathic practitioners, with an in-depth knowledge and understanding of their craft.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?

Yes. Each year group has an elected year representative who is in regular contact with the team of directors. Student feedback informs the continued development of the School.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

We aim to facilitate the above from a student-centred perspective, organically and in a flexible way - through cooperative process, education, challenge, evolution and development, with integration and honesty - using an excellent team of teachers, supervisors and a high standard of clinical training.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

No. We believe that life experience is more important than academic achievement. Entry is based on an individual interview.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

To apply in writing, to the student administrator, for an informal interview.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes? We run introductory weekend courses.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students?

Potential students are welcome to visit the School during a teaching weekend to talk to students and see the School 'in action'!

How large are the classes for each year group?

Class sizes are restricted to a maximum of 20 students.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

The Welsh School has its own property, which is solely used for the training and practice of Homoeopathy. It is situated in the centre of Carmarthen and has its own shop front, which is open every Saturday as a 'drop in' information centre run by the students and graduates of the School. There are also two teaching rooms, two clinic rooms, library, computer room, kitchen, and toilets.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Part-time only.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

Part-time: £1550 (with £100 discount if fees are paid in full before the beginning of the academic year).

Are there any additional charges during the course?

A+P/P+D correspondence courses (approximately £250 each), supervision costs, and School clinics (£15 per day).

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

academic training?

• practical training?

Obviously it is considered essential to have a clear understanding of the principles of the homoeopathic philosophy but the main emphasis is on the practical, clinical training. It is more vocational than academic.

• another area? (If so, please give details.)

We believe the course to be a 'personal journey', as the healer is led out from within. So, great emphasis is placed on personal development and self-reflection. The students are asked to keep a journal of their process. There is also a strong tutorial system in place.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

Much of this is an external part of the course through correspondence courses of A+P/P+D. Students who have already obtained qualifications in this area are exempt from the A+P course but are required to do the P+D course.

How long is a full-time course?

n/a

How long is a part-time course?

Four years. The first year is run as a 'stand alone' Foundation Year and students can then choose to apply to continue on the next three years of the course.

Are courses other than homeopathy available?

No.

Are combined courses available?

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

Core teaching staff are encouraged to attend any relevant seminars and are supported financially to do so. The School also runs regular CPD days which teachers are invited to attend. Supervision training is provided at the School. There are regular team meetings with time for personal reflection.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

There is an excellent pastoral care network within the School. Each student has a 'Buddy' (a student from one of the other year groups), a year rep, a year tutor, a supervisor, a clinical supervisor, a peer supervision group and easy contact with the core teachers and team of directors.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? This is included more specifically in the fourth-year curriculum. However, practice management is an integral part of the course.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training?

This is actively encouraged but only under supervision as part of the clinical training programme.

How is students' progress assessed?

Students' progress is continually monitored throughout the four years: through their written

assignments, their participation in class, their cases, their final-year project, their A+P/P+D courses, their tutorials, their own self-reflection and feedback from their supervisors.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

There are 3 aspects to the clinical training:

1. The attendance at the School's training clinic - held every other Friday at the School. This gives the students the opportunity to see 'live cases' being taken through a video link and an opportunity for the third- and fourth-year students to take the cases. Minimum attendance requirements are one clinic in the first year, four in the second year, and five in the third and fourth year.

2. Students are required to 'sit in' and observe a variety of homoeopathic practitioners.

3. Students are required to take 8 acute cases and 15 chronic cases (two with four followups and the rest with two). All cases are done under supervision.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

150 hours.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

No. A minimum of 85 hours is done at the School training clinic. The rest are obtained through sitting in with a variety of other homoeopaths or attending other training clinics, e.g. at the Dynamis School.

How is clinical performance assessed?

Clinical performance is assessed through the students' casework (8 acutes and 15 chronics), via their supervisor and the School's Clinical Director. It is also assessed through their contribution at the School's Training Clinic. The student's own self-reflection is also an important part of this process.

When does clinical training begin?

Clinical training begins towards the end of the first year when they attend their first clinic and begin their 'sitting in'.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses? (2004-05): Professional course £1600 if paid in advance before July. Foundation Course £395. Stage payments available for both courses.

Are there any additional charges during the course?

On the professional course - essential texts, part payment towards monthly clinical supervision, the Teaching Clinic and clinical insurance in years 2-4.

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

Supervised practical experience from the outset of the course underpins the academic theory and philosophy provided in teaching sessions. The teaching of all core subjects is integrated throughout the course and made 'practical' with the use of illustrative cases.

• another area? (If so, please give details.)

Emphasis also on: interpersonal skills; practitioner development and reflection; preparation for practice.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

Human Science is taught throughout the course by medically qualified homœopaths (approx 25 hours per year). An holistic approach is used, integrating homœopathic casework, materia medica and philosophy. The subject provides sufficient grounding in medical terminology and orthodox diagnosis and pathology to ensure that graduates are able to communicate with other healthcare practitioners and recognise and respond to danger signs and symptoms presented by their patients.

How long is a full-time course?

How long is a part-time course?

Professional course is four years - ten weekends per year from September to June plus monthly teaching clinic, clinical tutorials, directed home study and continuous assessment. **Are courses other than homeopathy available?**

No but the course provides students with the necessary insights into other 'adjunctive' therapies which are used by practitioners to support the homœopathic healing process including nutrition, lifestyle advice, flower essences and meditation.

Are combined courses available?

No.

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

All our qualified teachers are registered with the Society of Homeopaths and thereby follow an active CPD policy. Where appropriate staff are supported in pursuing external CPD relevant to their roles within the School and internal CPD is included in team and individual staff meetings. There is considerable mutual support within the Core Team reinforced by two experienced Directors of Studies.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

Student peer support groups, buddy system and inter-group networking are actively encouraged. Student year reps and Society of Homeopaths student rep. Twice yearly personal tutorials with the Year Tutor who is also available throughout the course for informal tutorials. Regional Clinical Tutors/case supervisors seen monthly and available for consultation at other times. Students' reflective Learning Journal 'shared' with the appropriate tutors. 'Open access' to subject tutors, Directors of Studies and Directors. Access to independent personal supervision. Informal and formal complaint and appeal procedures. The School Office and bookshop are open five days per week and the Administrative Director is present at all teaching weekends and Teaching Clinics.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Integrated into several areas of the course but the main focus is within the Practitioner Development module in years 1-4. Business promotion, record keeping, accountancy, legal and other related matters are covered in years 3 and 4.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? The fully supervised development of practical skills lies at the heart of the course. Students are encouraged to begin to apply their developing knowledge early in Year 1 by taking simple acute cases under the supervision of their Regional Clinical Tutor who when appropriate will give approval to prescribe. From Year 2 this process is gradually extended to more complex cases and complemented by supervised case-taking and prescribing in the School's monthly Teaching Clinic. At all stages prescribing is fully supervised and students are appropriately covered by clinical insurance.

How is students' progress assessed?

Continuous assessment by core staff throughout the year primarily from: assignments; occasional small tests in class time; two annual clinical exercises linked to a video recorded case and an audio recorded case; twice-yearly formal feedback from the Regional Clinical Tutors; regular formal feedback from the Teaching Clinic; peer and self-assessment/reflection; the Clinical Portfolio; an extended project submitted in Year 4.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

Although 'Clinical Studies' is a separate taught unit, throughout the course 'clinical training' is integrated into all the core units and the sessions provided by specialist visiting lecturers. Students are also allocated to a Regional Clinical Tutor from Year 1 who supervises the casework they are required to undertake outside the teaching weekends. From Year 2 students begin to attend the School's Teaching Clinic as 'observers' and from Year 3 they participate in supervised case-taking and case discussion. In addition, from Year 2 students 'work shadow' with practising homœopaths.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

Because 'Clinical Training' takes place in all the components of the course it is difficult to provide a precise figure. A 'figure' is also misleading, as it does not reflect the 'quality' of the experience/achievement. *Excluding* experience during teaching weekends the *minimum* total time is 450 hours over the four years of the course though most students will exceed this.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

No. The minimum time spent in the supervised Teaching Clinic is currently 150 hours though we have plans to increase this. *All* the remaining individual case-taking is supervised by the Regional Clinical Tutors.

How is clinical performance assessed?

'Clinical performance' is assessed in *all* the components of the course. Within those that are 'specifically clinical' the overall assessment reflects a combination of: Regional Clinical Tutor reports on supervised casework; supervisor reports and peer assessment on observed cases at the Teaching Clinic; patient feedback; self-assessment and reflection in the Clinical Portfolio and Learning Journal on all cases; annual 'video case' and 'audio case' assessments; assessment of the final graduation Clinical Portfolio including at least one independent site-visited clinical report.

When does clinical training begin?

Supervised clinical training commences at the beginning of Year 1.

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

They will have acquired the mental readiness for practising as homoeopaths and the required professional knowledge. They will have learnt skills, which they should have as beginner homoeopaths, to treat ill people properly.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure?

There is a Bulletin Board System (BBS) on our website, and students can give their opinions or questions. We also ask students to give us feedback about our lectures. The opinions will be reflected in the contents of our lectures.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

College principal Torako Yui, who has 15 years' experience as a homoeopath, trained in the UK, and has tailored this course to meet the demands of practising in contemporary Japan. We put a great deal of effort into approaches to iatrogenic diseases, and the teaching is based on the principal's actual clinical experience of treating many difficult cases in Japan.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

No. We do not set any requirements regarding educational background.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Ask for a brochure, join a college's explanatory meeting, fill in and submit an application for admission.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes?

No, but we hold the college's explanatory meeting and we also show pictures of classes and contents of classes on our website at any time.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students?

Although we are not providing any specific opportunities, many students apply for admission after they got to know about homoeopathy through our graduates. Existing students join in the college's explanatory meetings and potential students have opportunities to listen to their stories.

How large are the classes for each year group?

The first-year students in 2004: about 90 in our Tokyo school, about 30 in our Osaka school, and about 10 in Fukuoka school. An increase is expected in 2005.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

- Excellent lecturers, with Ms Torako Yui at the head of the list, plus invited top-class lecturers from overseas.
- Exclusive school buildings in each of our three locations (Tokyo, Osaka and Fukuoka), constructed using materials which respect the health of humans and the earth.
- Communication facilities which enable our three locations to relay a broadcast simultaneously.
- Students receive an original RAH textbook ten times a year which is written in Japanese, to aid learning.

- Homoeopathy centres/clinic, where students can attend actual clinical cases.
- Homoeopathic pharmacies, where students can get remedies etc. at a discount.
- Bookshops, where students can get homoeopathic books at a discount.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

Four-year part-time course only.

We provide a one-year animal course, and an optional evening anatomy, physiology and pathology course.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

Part-time course: 800,000 Japanese yen (Entrance fee: 150,000 Japanese yen, first year only) Animal course: 600,000 Japanese yen

Evening anatomy, physiology and pathology course: 40,000 Japanese yen

Are there any additional charges during the course?

There is no additional charge. However, if students wish to join the RAH UK schooling (five days of lectures in the UK given by prominent homoeopaths from a range of countries), they have to pay their flight and accommodation (the lecture fee is included in their annual fee). There are additional expenses such as books and graduation party, and so on. If they wish to attend the optional seminars by overseas lecturers, they can attend with student discount (50% off).

3. THE COURSES YOU OFFER

Do your courses place greater emphasis on:

academic training?

We regard theoretical background, which becomes a base for practice, as important. Academic training is something which becomes the base for practising homoeopathy, not something which is far from it. The theory, which is taught at the RAH, is also through practical experience.

• practical training?

We focus on practical training for advanced-level students. We train them from the skill of case-taking and how to come in contact with patients, to how to plan a course for a practice.

Lectures about the essential management skill of practising as a homoeopath are also within the curriculum.

How much study of orthodox medical science is required?

We provide lectures of pathology and physiology within the curriculum. At the same time, we provide an evening anatomy, physiology and pathology course as an option.

How long is a full-time course?

Part-time course: Four years (around 25 days annual)

Animal course as an option: One year

Evening anatomy, physiology and pathology course as an option: Ten times annually

How are teaching staff supported (for example with training or personal development opportunities)?

There are lecturers' meetings. They can attend the principal's classes. There are also CPD seminars for all graduates, including lecturers.

4. DURING TRAINING

What mechanisms are in place to support students during their training?

We encourage students to ask their questions during classes as the answers can be shared with other students. We also deal with private questions. There are always staff, who can deal with students' queries, in the office.

Is there any business training or preparation within the course for new practitioners? Lectures about management are within the curriculum. There are meeting opportunities for homoeopaths, during which they can get advice from seniors. They can also get support via our BBS.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? We encourage students to practise homoeopathy on people around them, depending on their learning levels. First-year students take easy cases of their family or acquaintances. Students deal with more difficult cases as they become senior. They can ask questions about how they could proceed with their cases during classes. We regard practice as an essential matter for learning homoeopathy.

How is students' progress assessed?

An examination for promotion (moving to the next year curriculum) is held annually. Students' feedback and case observations are also carried out.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

From the third year, case observation, making reports about cases, summarising patients' cases, and opportunities to practise at the student clinic are provided.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

More than 100 hours over two years. Students are also expected to summarise 60-70 patients' cases.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

Student clinics are held at the supervised clinics. Attending clinical cases can be done at the homoeopaths' practices all over Japan.

How is clinical performance assessed?

They can seek advice at any time. Assessment is done by submitting cases for their graduation. When does clinical training begin?

From the third year.

7. AND FINALLY ...

Is there anything else you'd like to add about your college?

Homoeopathy in Japan has finally started to be recognised by Japanese people, thanks to RAH principal Torako Yui. However, it is still not as well known among the general public as it is in the UK. Educating the general public is also a field in which the RAH is putting a great deal of effort, so that graduates are able to carry out homoeopathic consultations in easier circumstances.

The RAH invites superb lecturers from the USA, India, Europe etc. Although it is important to acquire theoretical knowledge in homoeopathy, the theory becomes something alive and its efficacy is judged at practice scenes. One of the policies of the RAH is: 'A method, which matches to an each individual patient, should be adopted. It should not be caught by only one technique.' Students are trained to be able to choose the best method to each individual patient by learning various methods without being partial to one style. Students can learn the forefront homoeopathy without being caught by one dogma at the RAH.

1. ETHOS OF THE COLLEGE

What do you hope your students will have achieved upon graduation?

Students will be able to practise with knowledge and confidence in homoeopathic paediatrics, which is often a very little understood area of homoeopathy.

Is there any student representation within the college framework/structure? No, this is a one-year postgraduate course.

Please illustrate in one sentence why students should attend your college for training in homeopathy.

There is a large gap in the training of homeopaths when it comes to treating children. Most have to struggle for years to gain the knowledge and experience required to create a successful practice in paediatrics. This course is designed to bridge that gap by providing training in paediatric care by experienced teachers who are experts in their field.

2. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Is there a minimum academic requirement for entry onto the homeopathy training courses?

Applicants must be licensed homeopaths. Third- or final-year students can apply but will only be accepted on special merits to be assessed individually.

What is the application procedure for new entrants?

Prospectuses are available on request. Interested applicants should send an introductory letter stating why they wish to do the course.

Do you offer introductory days or opportunities to 'sit in' on current classes?

This is a new course beginning in October 2006. Several one-day paediatric seminars will be run prior to this date, which prospective students may attend.

Is there an opportunity for potential students to talk to existing students?

This is a new postgraduate course so as yet there are no current students.

How large are the classes for each year group?

We expect the class size to be no more than 45.

Please describe the facilities your college has to offer.

All sessions will be held at the Academy Conference Centre, at the Holiday Inn Hotel in Gatwick. This new venue has the latest projection facilities, and is very well designed, warm and comfortable with a licensed restaurant and bar providing light snacks. Coffee and tea will be provided free of charge during breaks.

Do you offer an option of full- or part-time courses?

The course is being run as a one-year postgraduate diploma, however modules will also be available separately.

What are the charges per year for full-time/part-time homeopathy courses?

The course fees are £1595 for the full course.

All through the course there will be a strong practical emphasis on case-taking with video and paper case exercises, and students will learn how to safely examine children in practice. There will also be a strong focus on sound constitutional and miasmatic treatment, child development and psychology, and the pathology of childhood diseases.

Students are expected to already have a sound knowledge of anatomy and physiology. The pathology aspect of each session will be taught by a GP or midwife, and students will be encouraged to study this in more depth at home.

What is the college's policy regarding students practising homeopathy during training? As this is a postgraduate course, it is anticipated that most of the students will be practising homeopaths.

How is students' progress assessed?

Progress is measured by self-assessment, which will take the form of a questionnaire that students fill in after each session. There will also be a paper case study each month relating to the material covered that students will hand in for assessment. Individual tutorials will also help to gauge how each student is progressing with the course.

5. THE CLINICAL TRAINING YOU PROVIDE

Please describe your clinical training programme.

Recorded video cases will be shown at each session to give a clinical aspect to the subjects taught. A paper case will also be given out each month as homework for students to work on and consolidate their clinical learning.

How many hours of clinical training are students expected to achieve in order to graduate?

Students are expected to complete three cases, relating to three of the ten different age groups covered in the course, to be handed in as part of a portfolio at the end of the course. Each case should have a minimum of two follow-ups, and demonstrate competent case-taking and case analysis. Should it be needed, supervision for these cases will be provided for a small charge.

Are all of these hours to be in supervised clinics?

No, they are to be completed by students in their own clinics.

How is clinical performance assessed?

Students will not be expected to take live cases as part of their assessment.
